# Tips for using MiC

1. 2. 3. The numbered questions can be answered directly from the passage, so make sure you look for the answers in the text of the Bible.

The 'Think it Through' questions are to help you think further about what you have learned and to check how well you understand what you have discovered from answering the numbered questions, you may not find the answer *directly* from the passage.

It is worth making sure you understand the meaning of key words that are used in the Bible passages, so look out for these and the footnotes that are given to help you.

Remember that 'a text without a context can be a con', so make sure you look at the verses surrounding the passage you are studying in order to help keep you on the right track. We often don't get things wrong because we are being dishonest but rather because we are mistaken.

There are verses to memorise. The psalmist talks about hiding God's word in his heart so as to avoid sinning against God (Ps. 119:11), why not try committing some of God's word to memory.


# Study 1 (part 2): Philippians 3:4-9\*

For it is we who are the circumcision, we who worship by the Spirit of God, who glory in Christ Jesus, and who put no confidence in the flesh—4though I myself have reasons for such confidence.

If anyone else thinks he has reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: <sup>5</sup>circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; <sup>6</sup>as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for legalistic righteousness, faultless.

<sup>7</sup>But whatever was to my profit I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. <sup>8</sup>What is more, I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ <sup>9</sup>and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ—the righteousness that comes from God and is by faith (NIV).

<sup>1</sup>As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, <sup>2</sup>in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. <sup>3</sup>All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature objects of wrath. <sup>4</sup>But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, 5made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. <sup>6</sup>And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, 7in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. 8For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-<sup>9</sup>not by works, so that no one can boast. <sup>10</sup>For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do (NIV).

<sup>30</sup>But many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first.

<sup>1</sup>"For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire men to work in his vineyard. <sup>2</sup>He agreed to pay them a denarius\* for the day and sent them into his vineyard.

<sup>3</sup>"About the third hour\* he went out and saw others standing in the marketplace doing nothing. <sup>4</sup>He told them, 'You also go and work in my vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' <sup>5</sup>So they went.

"He went out again about the sixth hour and the ninth hour and did the same thing. <sup>6</sup>About the eleventh hour he went out and found still others standing around. He asked them, 'Why have you been standing here all day long doing nothing?'



# **Study 3: Titus 2:11-13**

<sup>1</sup>You must teach what is in accord with sound doctrine. <sup>2</sup>Teach the older men to be temperate, worthy of respect, self-controlled, and sound in faith, in love and in endurance.

<sup>3</sup>Likewise, teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live, not to be slanderers or addicted to much wine, but to teach what is good. <sup>4</sup>Then they can train the younger women to love their husbands and children, <sup>5</sup>to be self-controlled and pure, to be busy at home, to be kind, and to be subject to their husbands, so that no one will malign the word of God.

<sup>6</sup>Similarly, encourage the young men to be self-controlled. <sup>7</sup>In everything set them an example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness <sup>8</sup>and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us.

<sup>9</sup>Teach slaves to be subject to their masters in everything, to try to please them, not to talk back to them, <sup>10</sup>and not to steal from them, but to show that they can be fully trusted, so that in every way they will make the teaching about God our Savior attractive.

<sup>11</sup>For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men. <sup>12</sup>It teaches us to say "No" to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in this present age, <sup>13</sup>while we wait for the blessed hope—the glorious appearing of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ,

<sup>14</sup>who gave himself for us to redeem us from all wickedness and to purify for himself a people that are his very own, eager to do what is good. <sup>15</sup>These, then, are the things you should teach. Encourage and rebuke with all authority. Do not let anyone despise you (NIV).



#### Some reflection

In your prayers or devotional times (Quiet time), the following word "ACTS" can be very helpful in giving structure to your prayers. A small amount of time can be given to each of the four letters.

A for Adoration: Spend time praising God for who He is and what He has done for you in and through the person of Jesus Christ.

**C** for **Confession**: Talk to God about your sin, admit that you have failed him. Try to think of specific areas where you have failed from the previous twenty-four hours.

**T** for **Thanksgiving**: Spend time thanking God for all his blessings and the gospel. Start worrying if you cannot think of more than twenty things you can thank God for.

**S** for **Supplication**: This simply means you spend time bringing your requests or personal needs and the needs of others to God. Again be specific rather than generally asking God to just "bless everyone".

# **Janelle's Story**

For me prayer is a struggle. I struggle with the discipline of praying regularly. When the children were babies I got into the habit of praying on the go, which I still do.

I find, though, that I need to have regular time as well, where I go through my list of people that I want to remember. I like to tie this to my Bible reading. It helps me think God's way. I struggle with persevering in praying for people to become Christians when nothing happens or they get further away from God.

Then I need to remind myself that God is in control. I need to keep my eyes on him and not start thinking that if I prayed better then he would answer.

Let me share some of the joys of praying as well. When God answers me I find myself marvelling at his graciousness in stooping down and even bothering to listen-let alone answer. It reminds me of who he is and who I am as his child. Praying with someone else on a weekly basis has been a great joy, It's good to share and pray together and hold each other accountable.

Praying is a very personal thing. It's not a magic formula or a chant to convince the gods. It's part of the wonder that the God of the Universe wants to be in relationship with me and allows me to talk with him.
